- 13th To see if the town will join with Alfred and Lyman to provide a place for the poor or anything that the town shall think proper to act upon.
- 14th To see if the town will make any alterations in the districts.

- 1st Chose Jonathan Dearing, Moderator.
 - 2nd Chose Daniel Smith, Town Clerk and sworn.
 - 3rd Chose Selectmen: Daniel Smith, first; Samuel Bradeen, second; Samuel Carle, third and chose the same Assessors for the year and sworn.
 - 4th Chose Elder Henry Hobbs, Town Treasurer.
 - 5th Voted to have a committee to settle the town accounts and chose John Scribner, John C. Hill and James Carlisle for the committee.
 - 6th Voted to set the Constable and Collectors birth up to auction to the lowest bidder. Voted not to have but one the present year.
 - 7th Voted that the Constable and Collectors be the same persons with good bondsmen. Bid off by Col. John Hamilton at five dollars for his service.
 - 8th Voted to except Col. John Hamilton as Constable and Collector and sworn with his bondsmen, (viz.) Capt. Samuel Carle, James Stevens, James Hamilton and James Smith.
 - 9th Voted to adjourn this meeting one hour.
- Met according to adjournment.

- 10th Voted that every district nominate their own surveyors of highways.
Voted not to have but one surveyor on Roberts Road. Chose Andrew Roberts, Benjamin T. Hall, William Thing, Jonathan Hanson, John Hill, Jr., Thomas Hanson, Thomas Knight, William Guptail, John Scribner, Joseph Russell, Joseph Woodward, Miles Ford, Gideon Ricker, Robert Bradeen, James Chase, Aaron Bragdon, Samuel Dame and all sworn but Thomas Knight, William Guptail, and Aaron Bragdon.
Voted to survey this district. Chose Moses Pitts and Samuel Dame, Surveyors, Eli Chase, Col. John Hamilton, Jonathan Dearing, Josiah Sweat, Surveyors of highways and townways.
- 11th Voted to ballot for town agent. Chose Col. John Hamilton agent for the town the present year.
- 12th Voted to raise two thousand dollars to repair the highways and townways the present year.
- 13th Voted to raise three hundred and fifty dollars for the support of schools the present year.
- 14th Voted to raise seven hundred dollars to pay the town expenses the present year.
- 15th Voted not to raise any money to buy wood for schools, but every district find their own wood.
- 16th Voted not to keep hogs shut up the present year.
- 17th Voted to divide school districts No. 8 and for as many as signed peititon to district No. 12 to be set off to the district. Voted to adjourn this meeting to the first Monday in May at 10 o'clock a.m., same place.
- Monday, May 4. Met according to adjournment and voted as follows:
- 18th Voted every district nominate their own Tythingmen. Chose Noah Robertson, Benjamin Pierce, Esq., John Fisk, Jr., Elliot R. Bowdoin, Ephrim Clark, John C. Hill, Paul Chadbourn, Alando Bagley, Peter Carlle, Joshua Hill, Trustram Hooper, William Taylor, and Gilman Giles. Chose Humphrey Chadbourne and Dennis Johnson, Poundkeepers. Chose William Woodward, Theodore Allen, James Stevens, Luke Mills, Nathaniel Knight, Humphrey Chadbourne, John Scribner, John Mattocks, James Smith, Aaron Bragdon, William Bean, and John C. Hill, Haywards and fence viewers.
- 19th Voted not to raise any more money the present year for town use.
- 20th Voted to set the poor of the town up to auction to the lowest bidder for one year and not to have their pay until the year is up each paying taxes.

Jacob Rhoads bid off by Humphrey Chadborne at \$33.75 for one year and to find him all except doctors bills and to return him as will omit for clothing as he now is.
Ebenezer Guptail bid off by Humphrey Chadborne at \$1.20 cents per week to find him all except cloths and sick bills.
Pheby Paul bid off by Dennis Johnson at 33 cent per week except sick bill to find her all.
Abial Pond bid off by Daniel Robertson at 37 cents per week to find him all except sickness.
Viana Pond bid off by Tristram Firnald at nothing and find her all except sickness.
Benjamin Barns bid off by Humphrey Chadborne at nothing and was not to find him any clothing.
Lydia Hanson bid off by Thomas Hanson at one dollar per week and find her all.
Alice Gellison bid off by Humphrey Chadborne at 24 cents per week and find her all except sickness.
Moses Goodwin bid off by Hezekiah Cook at 24 cents per week until the Selectmen see fit to take him away.

- 21st Voted not to build a poor house the present year.
- 22nd Voted to impose all the surveyors with authority to distrain for their highway tax after giving due notice if they refuse or neglect to work or otherwise pay.
- 23rd Voted to accept a road laid out by the Selectmen from Josiah Johnson's dwelling house to the County Road near Carles Bridge.
- 24th Voted to let William, Betsy Harvey's third to the highest bidder.
- 25th Voted to allow the men that worked on Webber's Bridge accept the mill owners and voted to allow the mill owners half pay.
- 26th Voted to allow one dollar per day for work on the highway and town way.
- 27th Voted not to alter the road from Elder Henry Hobbs' meeting house to Henry Clark's house.
- 28th Voted that last year suveyors of highways last year hand their list of all that were deficient in working last year and have them put in this year's list.
- 29th Voted that all surveyors of highways call out their men in winter to clear the roads and fetch in a regular bill for the same and be allowed for the same out of their next year's tax.
- 30th Voted to dissolve this meeting.

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- 8th Voted to let Moses Goodwin to the lowest bidder, bid off by Col. John Hamilton at 43 cents per week. Voted to dissolve this meeting.
