

COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES  
April 23, 1991

INTRODUCTIONS: Present was: Chm. Robert C. Fay, Dennis G. Abbott, John C. Monteith, Chauncey Gerry, Debra Miles, Frank Allen, Michael McAlevey, Millard Genthner, Bob Gobeil, Stuart Miller, Pam L'Heureux, Glen & Rosie Bean, Art Smith, Rudy Ross, Fred Fay, Dwayne Morin. Stu Brower, Brenda Charland and Steve Everett arrived late.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT: Chm. Fay reported that the SAD budget vote is May 7th and Town Meeting is June 8th. The spring tax bills have gone out. There is a slight increase due to valuations were two million below anticipated amount. Will be contracting a sheriff for Rte. 5 swim area on weekends and have a constable during the week. The Town Report will be going to the printers on May 21. Council meeting on May 21st will be a candidate night, and will be a round table discussion with a question and answer period.

TOWN CLERK/TAX COLLECTOR: No report.

ROAD COMMISSIONER: Fred Fay reported that he only had three places to fix with all the rain that fell.

SAD #57 DIRECTORS: All three directors were present. Millard reported that the budget is a 3.3% increase from last years. The first proposal that was presented the the Board was for a 8% increase and the Board worked hard to get it down to a 3.3% increase. 80% of the school budget is locked into contracts. Sel. Abbott asked about the hot lunch program deficits, where are they shown in the book and why are we funding prior years deficits. Art Smith asked what the cost is per student to bus that student, Millard told Art that the average cost to bus a student is \$400. district wide. If the budget gets defeated and the original requests are put back in, Waterboro's share will increase by 18%. Stu Brower asked what the pay is for teachers. Millard reported that teachers pay starts at \$109. a day for the school year of 180 days, the top pay is \$219. a day. The directors urged everyone present to vote on May 7th.

FIRE DEPT.: No report.

PLANNING BOARD: No report.

TOWN PLANNER: Dwayne reported on the curbside trash pickup bids. Waivers will have to be signed for them to go on private roads. Also went over the Clarks Bridge Road bids.

FINANCE COMM.: Art Smith reported that the committee has been meeting and hope in two weeks to have things finalized.

PARKS & REC. COMM: Bob Gobeil reported the comm. has been working on Rte 5 to make it residents only. Also are working on the lights at the Lions Field.

ROAD REVIEW COMM.: Fred reported that the comm. will be meeting sometime next week.

CONSTABLE: Chauncey Gerry reported that there is a problem with barking dogs.

CONSERVATION COMM.: Steve Everett reported that the comm. has been working with Evelyn Thompson. She wants to deed some of her property to the Town particularly the Moody Pond lot. Also Clayton Hurlburt has given the town a final offer to sell the town his property that he owns on Ossipee Mtn.

HAZARDOUS WASTE: Pam L'Heureux reported that all is quiet. Dwayne reported on the Swett oil spill that took place in Lyman on the Deerings Ridge Road. They are storing about 150 yards of oil contaminated dirt to their property on the Goodwin Mills Road. There has been alot of questions why is it being stored in Waterboro when it happened in Lyman.

REGIONAL WASTE: Frank Allen reported that they are in the middle of working on the budget and it looks like the tipping fee will stay the same at \$40.00 a ton. The Gorham site is on hold, waiting for the Planning Board.

CABLE TV: Frank reported that they have gone in to Lake Arrowhead. Cable company pays CMP \$5.42 a pole for their use. Chm. Fay asked what would happen if the Town went out to stimulate business from other cable companies to come into the area.

RECYCLING COMM: Debby Miles reported that the comm. is very busy. The comm. has concerns over curbside pickup may have on the recycling program in town.

TAYLOR/FRYE/LEAVITT HOUSE BOARD OF TRUSTEES: Art Smith reported that bids have gone out to fix the front of the barn and for painting the barn and house.

WATER TASK COMM.: Dwayne reported that more pipe is being laid. The pump test on the new well site will be done tomorrow. Water should be turned on sometime in September. Sel. Abbott reported that a water storage tank is about one year down the road.
